### article (not "research article")

Follow the rules in "[Magazine](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references. Do not include details such as day, month, volume, issue or number of pages if they are not provided or are not applicable.

[open-access article] Jha, V. (2017). [Developing the lifelong learning attitude](#). *New Business Age*. [in English]

### book

Follow the rules in "[Book](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references.

[book] Brems, E. (2001). *Human rights: universality and diversity*. Martinus Nijhoff Publishers. [in English]

### book chapter

Follow the rules in "[Book](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references.

[book chapter] Greco, G. M. (2016). On accessibility as a human right, with an application to media accessibility. In P. Orero, & A. Matamala (Eds.). *Researching audio description: New approaches* (pp. 11-33). Palgrave. [in English]

### legal document

Follow the rules in "[Government Publication](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references, instead of adding it at the end of the reference.

[open-access legal document] UN Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (CESCR). (1994). [General comment No. 5: Persons with disabilities](#) (E/1995/22). [in English]

### PhD thesis

Follow the rules in "[Dissertation/Thesis](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references, instead of adding it at the end of the reference. Do not write "Doctoral/MA/BA thesis" before the name of the university, since this information is already provided by the tag.

[PhD thesis] Heimann Mühlenbock, K. (2013). [I see what you mean – Assessing readability for specific target groups](#). Göteborgs Universitet. [in English]

(The same format applies for BA and MA theses, by changing the tag)

### **report**

Follow the rules in "[Government Publication](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references, instead of adding it at the end of the reference. Do not include Publisher if the report is self-published (i.e. if the publisher and author are the same).

[open-access report] European Broadcasting Union (EBU). (2016). [Access services pan European survey 2016](#). [in English]

### **research article**

Follow the rules in "[Journal without a DOI \(Digital Object Identifier\)](#)". Do not provide DOIs. Add hyperlink in title for open-access references.

[research article] Infante, M., & Matus, C. (2009). Policies and practices of diversity: reimagining possibilities for new discourses. *Disability and Society*, 24(4), 437-445. [in English]

### **research issue**

Follow/adapt the rules in "[Journal](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references.

[open-access research issue] Greco, G.M., & Jankowska, A. (Eds.). (2019). [Quality in Media Accessibility \[Special Issue\]](#). *Journal of Audiovisual Translation*, 2(2). [in English]

### **standard**

Follow the rules in "[Government Publication](#)". Add hyperlink in title for open-access references, instead of adding it at the end of the reference. Do not include Publisher if the standard is self-published (i.e. if the publisher and author are the same).
