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About ITFLOWS

The overall aim of ITFLOWS is to provide accurate predictions and adequate management solutions of migration flows in the European Union in the phases of reception, relocation, settlement and integration of migration, according to a wide range of human factors and using multiple sources of information. These insights will be provided by an evidence-based ICT enabled solution, the EUMigraTool (EMT) and precise models. All solutions will have fitness for purpose continually validated by policy-makers and practitioners in cooperation with civil-society organisations in a dynamic and iterative process.

ITFLOWS will propose tailor-made solutions for practitioners and policy makers for managing migration. On the one hand, the EMT targets first-line-practitioners, second-level reception organisations and municipalities. It will provide modular solutions based on the prediction of migration flows and the identification of risks of tensions between migrants and EU citizens. On the other hand, an in-depth analysis on drivers, patterns and choices of migration as well as public sentiment towards migration will lead to the drafting of adequate recommendations and good practices for policy makers, governments and EU institutions.

Executive Summary

This document -Deliverable 9.2- outlines and presents the Communication and Dissemination strategy for the ITFLOWS project. This strategy sets out the plan for targeting the various relevant stakeholders in an effective manner. The strategy has been completed using the appropriate European Commission guidance documents as a point of reference.¹²³

Firstly, this strategy introduces ITFLOWS considerations such as methodologies to be used, roles and responsibilities of ITFLOWS partners and initial dissemination and communication outputs and opportunities. The strategy also captures and presents communication and dissemination efforts which have been completed thus far including the development of the project logo and website, ITFLOWS social media channels etc., then briefly outlines the current progress of dissemination efforts and planned upcoming activities by consortium partners.

The need for flexibility and agility both in terms of this plan and communication and dissemination efforts will be key to ensuring that ITFLOWS efforts reach the appropriate stakeholder groups. The need for such flexibility is present as a result of potential internal programme developments, external environment changes, and newly identified communication and dissemination channels. This strategy will therefore develop and evolve throughout the duration of the ITFLOWS project. In keeping with the “ever evolving” ethos of this strategy, the quantity of such activities will grow over time resulting in the plan being updated accordingly at Month 18.

1. Introduction

ITFLOWS seeks to provide accurate predictions and adequate management solutions of migration flows in the European Union. The project consists of nine work packages (WPs), each of which has specific objectives. Communication and dissemination tasks are addressed by WP9 in ITFLOWS. The objectives of WP9 are to:

- Ensure dissemination of results to four target groups (stakeholders): a) academia, b) policy makers, c) potential end users of the EMT, data providers (i.e. statistical agencies of member states) and social partners, and d) general public;
- Share knowledge and discuss research results with other academics for peer reviews and with policy makers for the validation of policy implications;
- Promote the exploitation of ITFLOWS results to support decision making for societal impact;
- Communicate the evidence base collected through ITFLOWS in a strategically, targeted manner in order to promote improved integration in Europe.

WP9 is especially focused on ensuring that the work undertaken throughout this project is brought to the attention of, and where possible actively involves, as many relevant stakeholders as possible. Stakeholder engagement is an intrinsic successful factor for the implementation of ITFLOWS. In this regard it aims to:

- **Build relationships with key stakeholders.**
 - To obtain the necessary feedback to focus the needs of ITFLOWS.
 - To foster collaboration with relevant stakeholders to share resources, achieve synergies and exchange information and knowledge.
- **Raise European awareness** about the project and its objectives, its results and outputs, its benefits, use and applicability.

1.1 Project outputs in relation to Communication and Dissemination

The key purpose of ITFLOWS WP9 is to support the overall project objectives in the context of best practice communications. WP9 will develop and deliver communication and dissemination outputs which will be designed to facilitate knowledge sharing and two way communication throughout the projects duration. Such outputs include for example, the ITFLOWS website and social media platforms as outlined in section 2.

As illustrated in Figure 1, examples of major project outputs which need to be communicated either internally (to the project consortium) or externally (to stakeholders). Table 1 below, provides further detail of these examples.

3. Communication and Dissemination Methodologies

As a CSA (Coordination and Support Action) orientated programme, clear, effective and consistent communication will be key in ensuring that the appropriate stakeholders are reached both during and beyond ITFLOWS. As outlined within (EC 2014),⁴ communication efforts should function as a mechanism which demonstrates the way in which research and innovation is being conducted at an EC level, with a view of ensuring that these efforts have the potential to reach EU citizens and beyond.

The European Commission (EC 2014) provides the following checklist which will be continuously applied when completing communication and dissemination efforts throughout the duration of ITFLOWS.

In terms of a specific methodological approach, ITFLOWS will employ a methodology which provides a 360 degree or continuous cycle approach consisting of planning, performing and reporting.

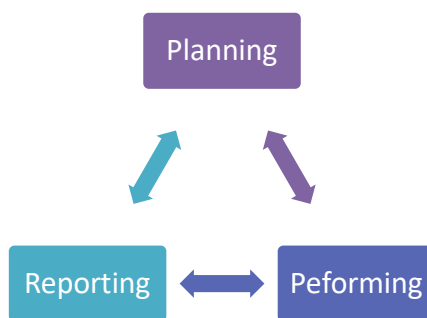


Figure 2: ITFLOWS Communication and Dissemination Methodology

The planning stage will consist of considering fundamental questions such as:

- Who is the target audience?
- At what point is dissemination taking place?
- What is the content being disseminated?
- Who is completing the dissemination?
- How are we going to measure the dissemination impact?
- What kind of indicators are we going to use?
- How will it be disseminated?
- Is there a need to disseminate and why?

The performing stage will consist of the dissemination and communication effort itself, ensuring that the message being transmitted conforms to EU research and ITFLOWS appropriate content. In order to ensure such validation, content will be approved by the WP9 leader and ITFLOWS coordinator as outlined in table 4.

Print Media Outputs
* WP9 leader (CEPS) will review proposed dissemination material (e.g. press releases) submitted in good time by the partner to allow for sufficient review and forwarding of the material to the ITFLOWS Coordinator.
* The ITFLOWS coordinator will provide final approval of the material to be communicated externally through the selected dissemination mechanisms.
Social Media Outputs
* ITFLOWS partners will update WP9 leader (CEPS) and T9.3 leaders (MTU) with updates in relation to upcoming or past events and/or news related to the work they have completed/will be completed.
* T9.3 leaders (MTU) will publish material and maintain the social media tools.
* All ITFLOWS partners should contribute to social media communication through their own organisational pages/feeds using relevant hashtags throughout the project duration.

3.1 Responsible Consortium Members

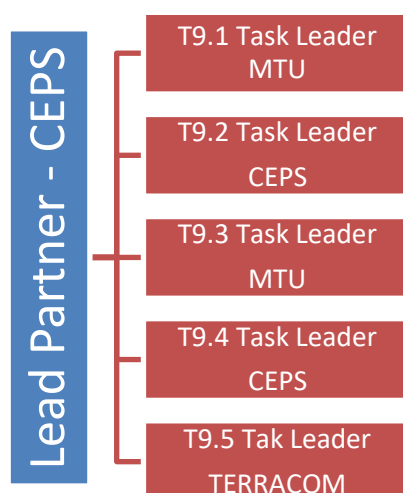


Figure 3: ITFLOWS Communication and Dissemination Partners

With an allocation of 72 Person Months (PMs) throughout the project duration of 36 months, there is a need for efficient dissemination and communication efforts in order to ensure that ITFLOWS reaches the necessary audience. Figure 3 outlines the management structure of WP9 outputs, with CEPS acting as WP and task leaders alongside task leaders Munster Technological University (MTU) and Terracom (TRC).

In terms of allotted PMs, Table 3 outlines the allocation of PMs to WP9 throughout the project’s duration. All consortium partners have PMs allocated to WP as detailed in Table 5 In order to ensure that ITFLOWS efforts are disseminated and communicated with lean PM allocations, the overarching ethos will be for consortium members to be efficient with PM utilisation, seeking out opportunities to complete dissemination efforts in parallel to primary efforts.

3.2 Communication and Dissemination Channels

ITFLOWS utilises a broad range of contemporary mechanisms to communicate project information. Such methods include:

3.2.1 Intranet

The consortium chose a secure GDPR compliant platform, Microsoft Teams, which provides not only for internal communication, but also for file-sharing. It is actively used by the consortium with regular meetings held online via the platform with the project coordinator. Also, each work package has a specific chat that is used to support communication among its participants. UAB maintains this tool and ensures accessibility for all partners.

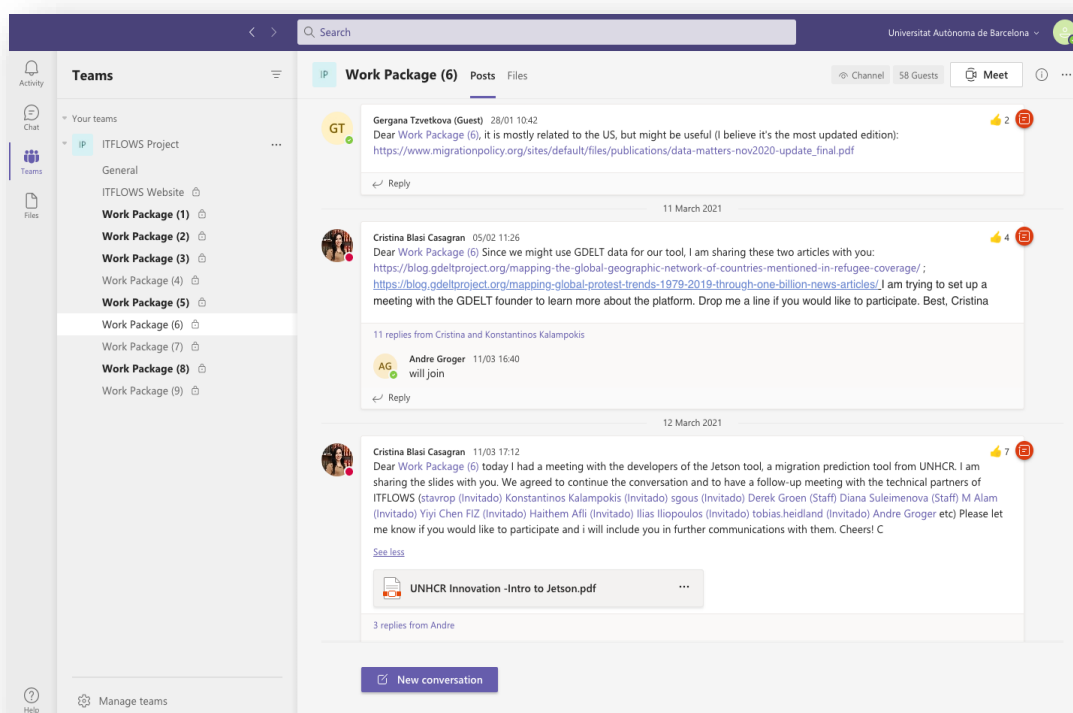


Figure 4: ITFLOWS account on MS Teams

3.2.2 ITFLOWS Website

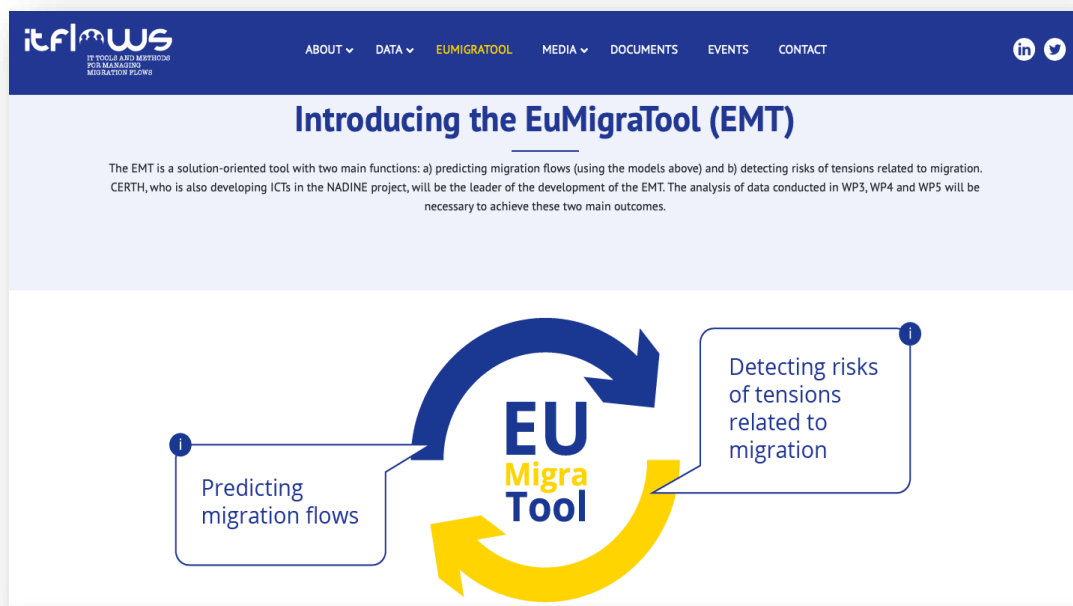


Figure 5: Introduction to the EMT

As detailed previously in D9.1 the ITFLOWS [website](#) is a critical supporting tool for facilitating ITFLOWS activities. The website was officially launched on the 10th November 2020. Central components in the website from a communication and dissemination perspective include the EMT which will be hosted on ITFLOWS website, a media section comprising of both news and social media updates, a repository for ITFLOWS main outputs as journal articles, reports and policy papers

and also an events section. Examples of these on the project website can be viewed in Figures 5-10.

MTU is leading ITFLOWS “Meet Our Partner Series” which allows us to take a closer look at each of our fourteen partners within the consortium and share details about their work. Partner videos are shared via UAB’s [YouTube page](#). ITFLOWS YouTube videos and ITFLOWS Tweets from our Twitter account are linked directly to our website social page (Fig. 8) as per the Horizon2020 guidelines.⁵

The website also includes a section to register to the ITFLOWS Newsletter to keep updated on the latest developments and outputs of the project.

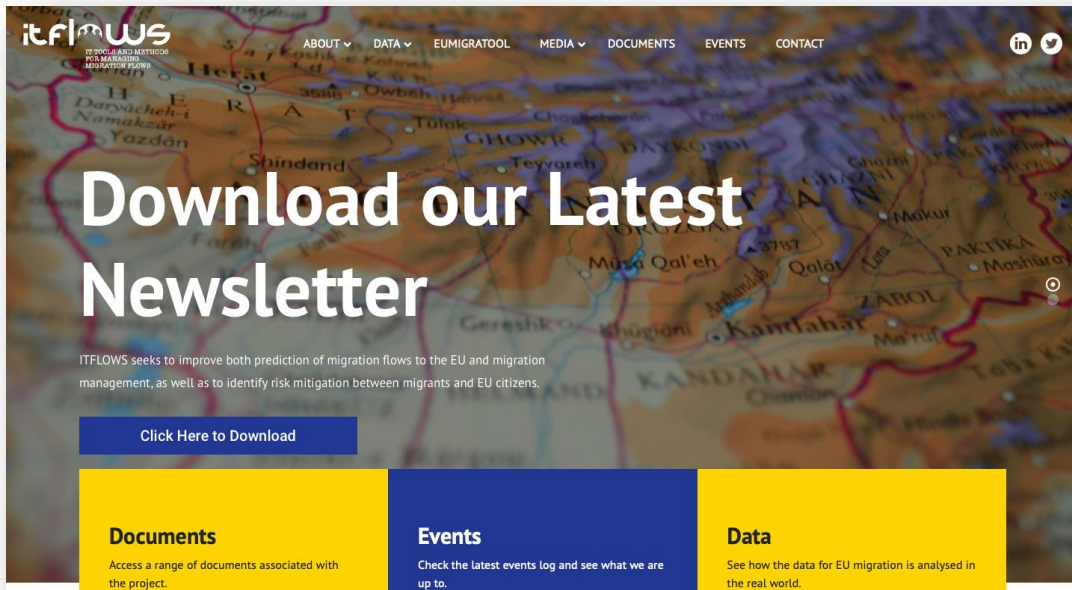


Figure 6: ITFLOWS Website Homepage

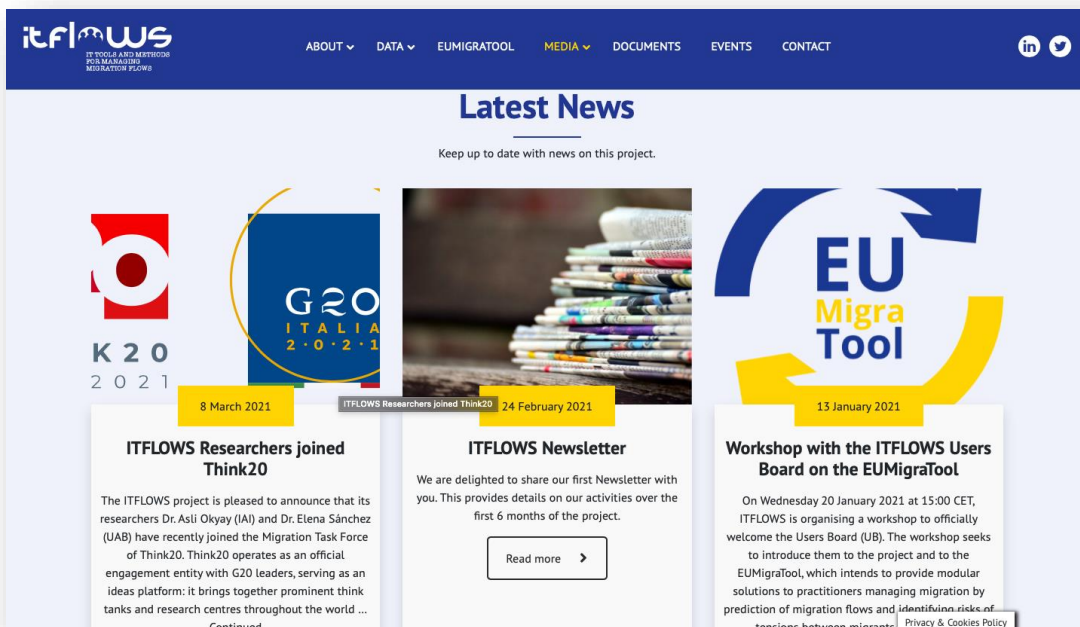


Figure 7: ITFLOWS News Page

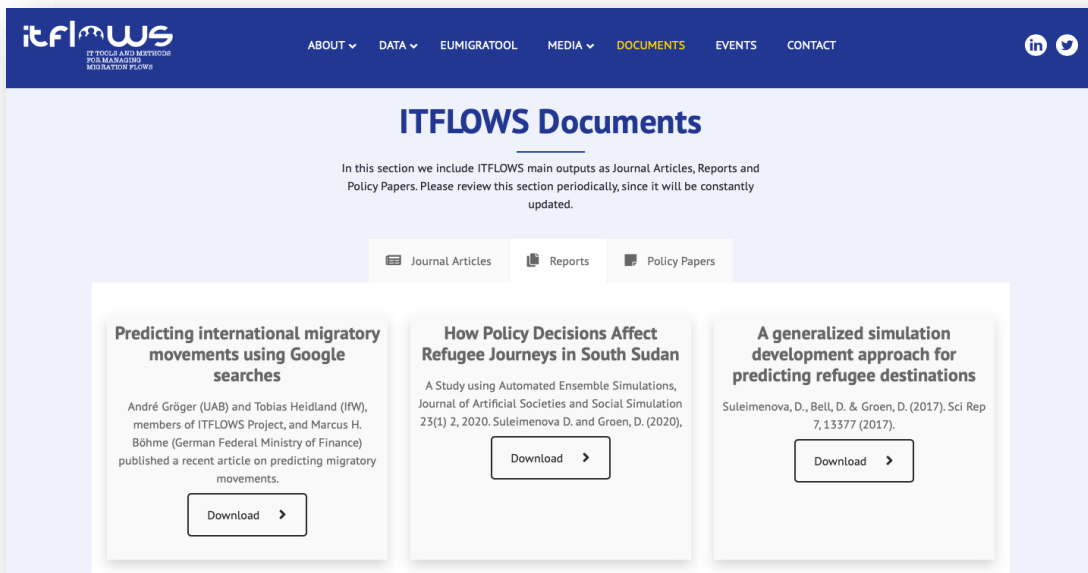


Figure 9: ITFLOWS Documents Page

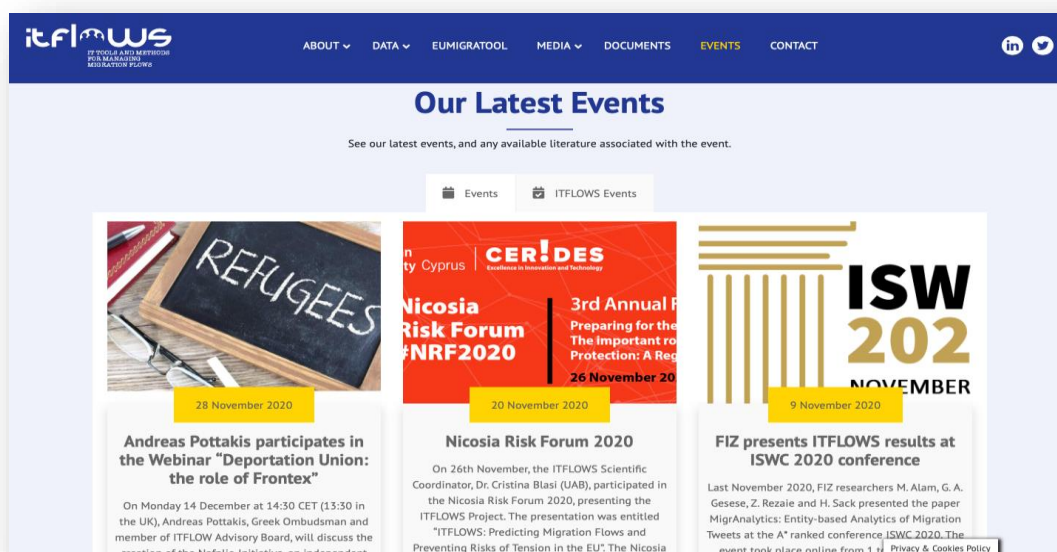


Figure 10: ITFLOWS Events Page

3.2.3 Electronic Newsletters

As detailed in D9.1 ITFLOWS will develop and publish a biannual electronic newsletter for the duration of the lifetime of the project. MTU is responsible for creating the newsletter. Inputs are gathered from all partners. The WP9 leader CEPS and MTU decided to send the newsletter and all upcoming newsletters via the dedicated 3rd party platform MailChimp instead of HubSpot which we initially set up as we found Mailchimp to be more user friendly. With the assistance of graphic design company [2b-creative](#) a Mailchimp plugin was incorporated into the website. ITFLOWS newsletter is a useful instrument to update all stakeholders on what ITFLOWS has achieved over a 6 month period. It aims to inform stakeholders on future events and contributions that are related to ITFLOWS. The first newsletter detailed a welcome address from coordinator Cristina Blasi Casagran, information on our “Meet Our Partners Series”, it detailed our past events, listed relevant publications, recognised our researchers of the semester and finally provided some latest news on migration. The first ITFLOWS newsletter was released in February 2021 and can be found in Appendix 1. In addition to our newsletter, subscribers to ITFLOWS will be kept up to date on our latest developments through regular emails that will be sent via MailChimp.

3.2.4 Social Media Platforms

A number of social media platforms have been developed in order to ensure that ITFLOWS project activities and results achieve a wide reach. ITFLOWS social media accounts have been established within relevant professional and mainstream portals including Twitter (@ITFLOWS1), [ResearchGate](#) and [LinkedIn](#). ITFLOWS videos are shared via UAB's dedicated [YouTube page](#).

Additionally, a number of relevant hashtags have been identified in order to further facilitate effective communication. Such hashtags include, but will not be limited to; #migrationflows #refugees #asylumseekers #itflows #migrants #EMT #EUMigraTool. ITFLOWS consortium members will also be tasked with channelling dissemination and communication outputs/efforts throughout their organisational portals. Such effort is an efficient, streamline and effective means for ensuring that ITFLOWS outputs reach the necessary EU audience.

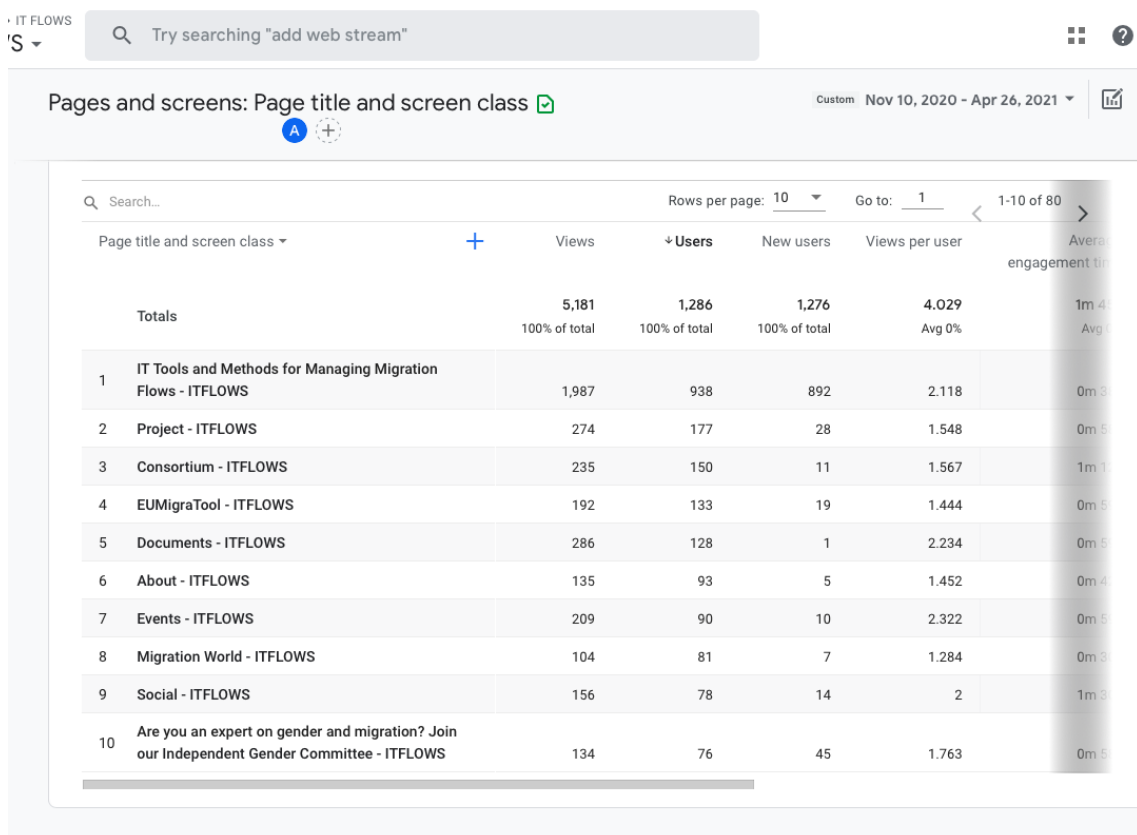


Figure 12: ITFLOWS website statistics from Google Analytics

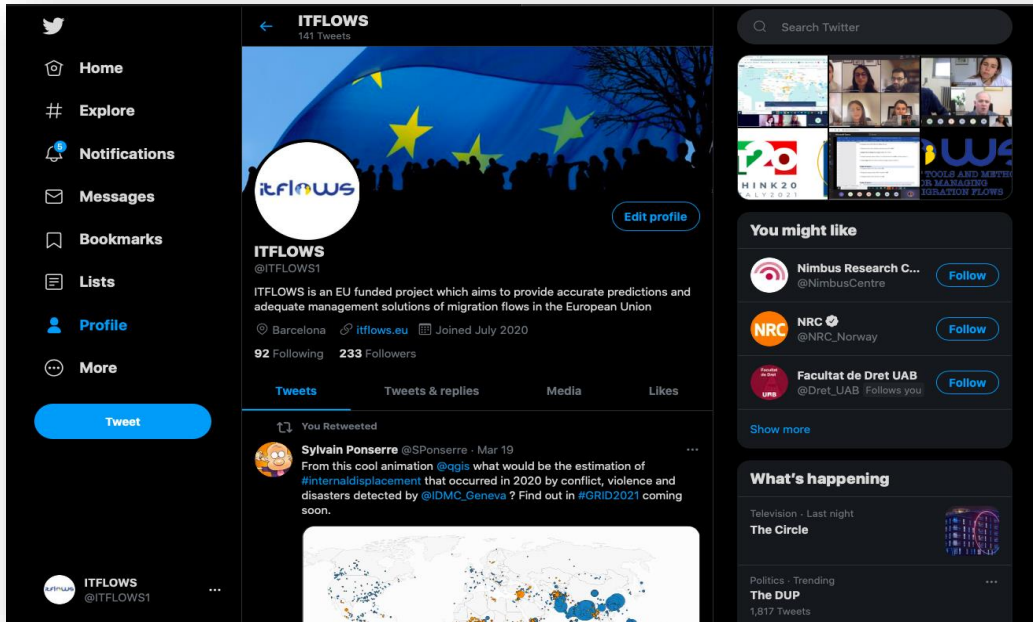


Figure 13: ITFLOWS Twitter account

Our LinkedIn page now has 181 followers. This following has increased by over 57% since November 2020.

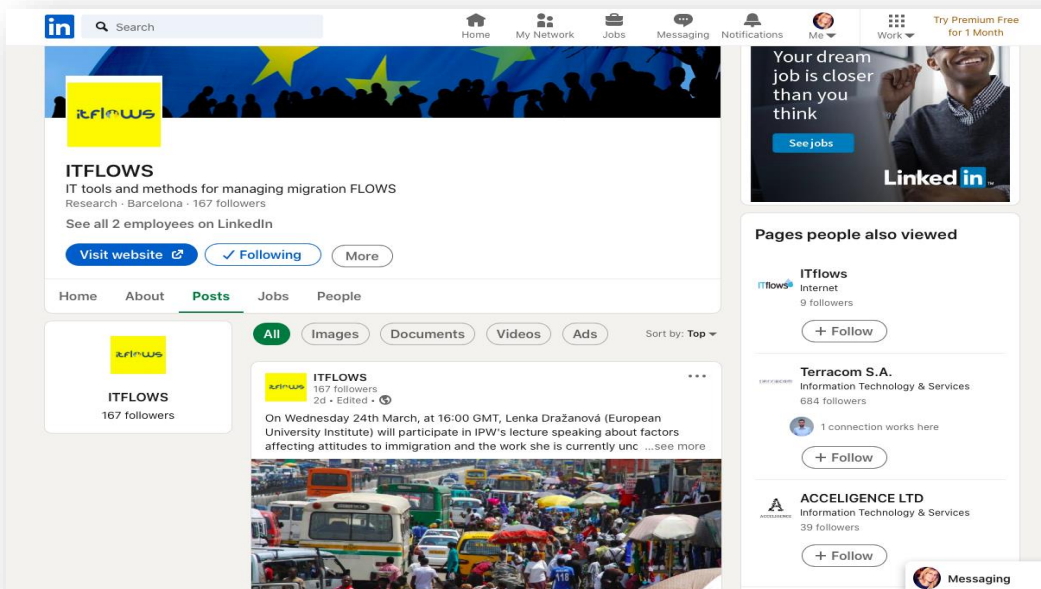


Figure 14: ITFLOWS LinkedIn account

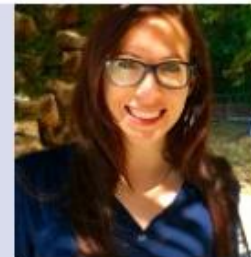

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Latest on Migration

As migration is driven by numerous pull and push factors, migrants' choice of a country of final destination is partially shaped by narratives as well. New communication networks intensify this phenomenon by enlarging the scope and intensity of the distribution of these narratives. Media emerges as a transmitter of perceptions that often go uncorrected, but it can also provide the means to correct misperceptions and promote realistic narratives.

This is one of the main points made in the brochure **"Migration to the EU. A Review of Narratives and Approaches"** published in January 2021 within the framework of the Horizon 2020 **PERCEPTIONS** project. The brochure summarises current knowledge on migration narratives about the European Union (EU) and current approaches to migration since 2015 across 15 EU and non-EU countries. Following the publication of the brochure, which reported findings from the first, research phase of PERCEPTIONS, empirical work will investigate narratives from migrants, first-line practitioners and policy-makers as well as their spread in social media. The next phase will further investigate what countermeasures of perceiving 'migration as a threat' could look like according to the different actors involved.

Center for the Study of Democracy is a project partner to both PERCEPTIONS and ITFLOWS projects. CSD's mission is "building bridges between scholars and policy-makers" and as an independent, interdisciplinary think tank it combines a broad range of capacities.

EUMigraTool

ITFLOWS will provide accurate predictions and adequate management solutions of EU migration flows in the phases of reception, relocation, settlement and integration of migration, according to a wide range of human factors and using multiple sources of information.

These insights will be provided by an evidence-based ICT enabled solution (the EUMigraTool) and precise models. All solutions will have fitness for purpose continually validated by policy-makers and practitioners in cooperation with civil-society organisations in a dynamic and iterative process.

The backend of the EUMigraTool will comprise two complementary approaches to simulation and forecasting. The first approach will be based on agent-based modelling, while the second approach will rely on deep learning, which is currently the predominant paradigm in artificial intelligence.
