## INCASI Living Lab

**INCASI Living Lab** (ILL) is an open space for reflection on socio-economic inequalities that promotes scientific cooperation, exchange and knowledge transfer through seminars and meetings between the academic and socio-political, national and international spheres, with the aim of disseminating and discussing analyses, diagnoses and recommendations that serve to guide public policies.

At the time of writing this issue, 36 sessions have been held since the start of the project, with three different modalities: **Seminars**, which are organised mainly on the occasion of each research stay, **Methodological Issues**, where different methodological contents are presented, both from a qualitative and quantitative or mixed perspective, linked to the



#### Women's share of total wages 2019

Developed as part of the World Inequality Lab, it measures the wage share of women compared to men, an important element in measuring gender inequality and women's empowerment.



### Artificial Intelligence Workshop

On 7 November 2024, the workshop **Social Sciences, Computational Methods and Generative Intelligences** by **Juan Barri**, from the National University of Cordoba, Argentina, was held in the Laboratory of the Faculty of Social Sciences of the UPO, with the aim of providing an introduction to the use of computational methods in the Social Sciences, in the context of the disruptive emergence of Generative Intelligences.



We worked on these axes: a) What is called Computational Social Sciences: 'field', method and theory. The interdisciplinary dimension. b) Computational languages and frameworks: Python, R and structured languages. Integrated applications. Notebooks as resources: jupyter notebook and markdowns. c) Generative intelligences: definition, context and modes of use in the social sciences. Three ways of working to enhance research. d) Data capture and processing. The changes produced in the 'digital era' with the emergence of big data: web



scraping, fingerprinting and API connections. e) Machine learning: supervised and unsupervised algorithms. Clustering. f) Natural Language and Graph Processing Techniques.

### **INCASI Policy Brief**

### Inclusion of a social inequality perspective in Employment Policy Evaluation

This first issue of the INCASI Policy Brief addresses the evaluation of Active Employment Policies (PAE) in Spain and Andalusia, focusing on the need to incorporate an analysis of inequalities in their design and evaluation. Despite the advances in the evaluation culture promoted by the European Union, significant challenges remain, such as the lack of coordination between territorial levels, the quality of the data used and the lack of impact of evaluations on policy decision-making. Among the most relevant labour market problems are unemployment, job insecurity, characterised by high



temporality and low wages, and the seasonality of certain jobs. These problems disproportionately affect vulnerable social groups, such as women, young people, foreigners and those with low levels of education. The lack of specific programmes and insufficient resources for these groups exacerbate the situation. The author proposes that SAPs should be designed with a common strategy that contemplates both 'generalist' and 'specific' measures, allowing for a comprehensive evaluation that considers the impact of policies on the reduction of inequalities. As an innovative element, the author stresses the need to develop a methodological perspective that facilitates the implementation of the perspective of social inequalities in the evaluation of public policies.



This study addresses income stratification by social class and gender in the Spanish working-class population from 2006 to 2019. Zhou's (2012) S Index measures the level of stratification by groups, determining whether social class and gender affect the distribution of income. Data were provided by the Living Conditions Survey of the Spanish National Institute of Statistics. The following main results were found: the link between social class and income persists; after the crisis, there was a reduction in the stratification of income by gender; and there is a greater polarisation of income in the female group. As a main contribution to the field of study, this work relies on an income stratification index as opposed to the classical inequality studies.

Individuals develop in increasingly interconnected, global, computerised, digitalised societies that require specific skills to socialise, work, move and even have fun in them. In this way, new inequalities are established in relation to technology that are linked to long-standing inequalities (Helsper, 2013). Based on a multidimensional approach to the phenomenon of social inequalities (Reygadas, 2004; Saravi, 2015), the differential appropriation of digital technologies (DT) in conjunction with previous inequalities, configure a new type of digital inequalities: the digital divide, of opportunities to take advantage of these technologies (van Deursen and Helsper, 2015).





# Well-being During the Pandemic. Comparative Perspectives from the Global North and South

This open access book focuses on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on well-being and quality of life, taking into account the mediating effects of social inequalities. The volume brings together and into dialogue the different experiences and perspectives of countries and researchers from

the Global North and South. Expert scholars from across the world have analyzed empirical data to reveal how the restrictions associated with the pandemic interrupted lives and livelihoods, and how different socio-economic groups and classes have been differently affected by the crisis. The chapters coalesce around four themes: the impact of COVID-19 on subjective well-being, life satisfaction and happiness in a comparative and longitudinal perspective; the impact of COVID-19 on employment and workers' well-being; sociability, civic participation and solidarity during COVID-19; and the impact of COVID-19 on children's and youths' well-being. Engaging with contemporary theoretical debates on well-being and quality of life, this volume is of interest to scholars working on global phenomena, transnational phenomena, the social impact of COVID-19 and social and economic change.
