
Presentation

The incessant activity of the network continues: secondments, seminars, congresses, publications, meetings, reports, etc. At the time of publication of this eighth issue of the bulletin, we have carried out 142 months of secondments by 94 researchers in the network, with 76 INCASI Living Lab seminars, numerous publications that have already come to light and others are on the way, we project ourselves in the congresses and in our academic networks, concerned about the scientific knowledge of the dynamics of social inequality in Europe and Latin America and the Caribbean.

We note that the addendum to the Grant Agreement was finally formalized as a result of the Mid-term review of the project with the European Commission. Fundamentally, we redistributed a few months of secondments and formalized the replacement of the defunct INTAL (Institute for the Integration of Latin America and the Caribbean) with CLACSO (Latin American Council of Social Sciences).

We celebrate with great satisfaction the incorporation of CLACSO and its good reception and interest. We welcome Pablo Vommaro as a principal investigator of CLACSO, recently elected Executive Director of the institution.

Finally, we want to announce that this August 22 we will celebrate the 10 years of the INCASI network. It was then that we received the message from the European Commission announcing the award of the INCASI1 project. 10 intense years full of academic and personal satisfactions that we want to evoke in a virtual meeting. INCASI Living Lab

The **INCASI Living Lab** (ILL) is an open space for reflection on socioeconomic inequalities that promotes scientific cooperation, exchange and transfer of knowledge through seminars and meetings between the academic and socio-political spheres, national or international, with the aim of disseminating and discussing analyses, diagnoses and recommendations that serve to guide public policies.



Incorporation of CLACSO into INCASI2



We have recently had the opportunity to formalize the incorporation of CLACSO (Latin American Council of Social Sciences) into the INCASI2 project. CLACSO is an international non-governmental institution with associative status in UNESCO, created in 1967. Currently, it brings together 927 research and postgraduate centers in the field of social sciences and humanities in 56 countries in Latin America, the Caribbean and other continents (https://www.clacso.org/).

The incorporation of CLACSO has been possible after the disappearance of INTAL (Institute for the Integration of Latin America and the Caribbean) which participated at the beginning of the project. We maintained contacts with CLACSO through its former Executive Director, Karina Batthyány, and the recently elected new director, Pablo Vommaro, who will be the Principal Investigator at INCASI2.

We thank and celebrate the good reception, interest and predisposition that we receive from CLACSO at all times to participate in INCASI2. It was formally materialized recently, on July 5, in the addendum to the Grant Agreement with the European Commission as a result of some adjustments to the project based on the review of the Mid-term that we carried out in March. We welcome Pablo Vommaro and wish a fruitful collaboration that will surely enrich our project.

On the other hand, we note that from June 9 to 12, the X Latin American and Caribbean Conference of Social Sciences (#CLACSO2025) took place in Bogotá. The event was held under the title "Horizons and transformations for equality. Democracies, resistances, communities, rights and peace", where members of the INCASI network participated, and was accompanied by an international book fair of social sciences and humanities and an international film cycle, among other events. 

The objective is to analyze the influence of social stratification factors on the inequality of opportunities for graduation from higher education in Argentina and its temporal evolution across age cohorts. "Vertical inequality" linked to the achievement or not of higher-level credits and aspects of "horizontal inequality" according to type of institution of graduation are analyzed. A national survey on the Social Structure of Argentina (2021), with a probabilistic design, with 5,239 cases, is analyzed. The analysis shows that, among the factors ascribed, social class origin, sex and ethnicity have their own weight, with class being the



most relevant factor. Cohort exploration showed a slight trend of decrease in vertical inequality, but significant class effects are maintained and effects of social origin are noted in the type of graduation institutions, in addition to relevant patterns of horizontal stratification.

This article focuses on transnational care and social protection arrangements in families scattered across their origin context, Colombia, and their migration contexts in France and Spain. It considers gendered caring practices and their evolution over long time frames, applying a life course and trajectory perspective. The article draws on a multi-sited ethnography conducted in Marseille, Madrid, A Coruña, Medellín and Bogotá, with 31 members, mostly female, of three transnational families. Our research allows us to observe the transnational family in the various contexts the family members are located in -'here,' 'there' and 'beyond,'- encompassing intergenerational perspectives of the younger, adult or elderly respondents. The results show the birth, life and death of transnational families related to the evolution of family ties intertwined with the migratory, labour and life trajectories of its members, and with their care and social protection arrangements and the underlying tensions.

The purpose of these pages is to compare employment models and welfare regimes in Europe and Latin America, during the period 2008 and 2023. We have noted three issues. First, that the distribution institutions have regressed in all welfare regimes. Income inequalities increased in Europe and narrowed in some Latin American countries. Second, models of coordinated economies have been more supportive of income redistribution than liberal market economies. And third, the main dimensions associated with the reduction of inequalities are occupational and social institutions, tripartite governance, activation for employment and protection of employment against dismissal.

The ecological transition is a complex phenomenon that will lead to a socio-economic transition. The former incorporates the values of nature within ecosystems, while the latter is structured around class divisions and geographical divisions of labor. They involve different metrics. The integration of those two transitions is the subject of the article.



Climate policies have distinct effects on different continents, countries, occupational classes, professional qualifications, and socio-demographic components. If capable of assigning weights, values, and costs in a redistributive perspective, these policies can rebalance inequalities and have a positive impact on social justice. However, if they follow market dynamics, they will reinforce existing regressive trends. The aim of this article is, considering the European context, to provide a conceptual framework that integrates the social processes generated by the ecological transition, with a focus on analyzing inequalities and labor market segmentation.

This article analyzes the impact of maternity and paternity on the wages of men and women in Spain. The research uses a quantitative approach based on data from the Labour Force Survey for the year 2019. The results show that women continue to suffer from wage inequalities in the labour market compared to men with similar characteristics. The results on motherhood show that women with dependent children are paid slightly less than women without children. However, this punishment of motherhood dissipates when partiality is taken into account, which is the main cause of the wage gap between women with children and women without children. In turn, it is concluded that men, when they are fathers, obtain economic benefits understood as a reward for fatherhood.

Adopting a sociological vision of education means conceiving it as a social phenomenon, which can only be understood in relation to a broader context that involves the whole of society. The book addresses, through the integration of theory and empirical analysis, the role of education in the social structure and in the processes of social change or mobility. It notes the importance of education in modern societies, and

how education systems have expanded and modernized. It even explores the social consequences of the irruption of new technologies in education. It focuses on studying the processes of inequality in education that result from family characteristics, such as socioeconomic and cultural status or migratory status, as well as individual traits such as gender or disability. In addition, it offers educational policy tools with which to face the challenge of education.



Poverty and Social Inequalities: Critical Perspectives and Contemporary Challenges. Monograph coordinated by Clemente, A. and Chávez Molina, E. in issue 50 of the journal *Sociedad* (2025).

The set of articles presented in this dossier can be grouped into two levels: articles that address the topic of inequality based on structural causes (indebtedness, production and work) and another set that identifies, describes and analyzes concrete manifestations of how these issues affect people and their environment, feeding both poverty and inequality statistics, and mainly by motivating conflicts, organizing

practices in the family and community order, as well as supporting policies and programs that operate in the gaps of inequality (communicational, gender, generational, etc.) that in everyday life shape life in society.

Fernández-Mellizo, M., & Bayón-Calvo, S. (2025). Unequal dropouts for unequal backgrounds: a full-cohort analysis at Spanish universities. *International Studies in Sociology of Education*. https://doi.org/10.1080/09620214.2025.2499509

University dropout is a social problem with huge economic and social implications. In Spain, one-third of students withdraw from their studies, which is in line with the average for OECD countries. This study analyses the dropout patterns of a full cohort of undergraduate students in Spanish universities. In contrast to previous studies that used partial data from specific universities and/or survey data, this paper covers all universities in Spain. It is the first time to use official census data from the Integrated University Information System of Spain to provide robust evidence that could be extrapolated to other



contexts. The results show that academic performance during the first year of university is linked to unequal dropout patterns depending on the social origin of the students. As in other countries, a compensation effect is detected. Trajectories of low-performing students are heterogeneously translated into dropouts depending on the socioeconomic background of their families.

The first part of the book presents in four chapters the transformations in the productive, social and welfare structure of households between 2016 and 2024. Chávez Molina and Rodríguez de la Fuente delve into the direction of the impact of changes on household well-being. They investigate the profile of the population in poverty between 2016 and 2024. They conclude that the growth of poverty is not due to a process of change in the structure of social classes, but to a greater exposure of the intermediate sectors and of manual workers in large establishments, who previously presented greater protection.
