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## Presentation

In this second issue we report on the intense activity of the last two months. This is a period in the universities' calendar that has facilitated the realisation of numerous secondments (with 49 months in total to date) together with various activities related to the first Global Meeting of the INCASI2 project and the XV Spanish Sociology Congress. Thus, after 9 months of the project, we have reached an execution level of around 14%.

It should also be noted that throughout these first months of the project we have completed various milestones and deliverables that comply with the programmed progress of INCASI2. Thus, after formalising the *Grant Agreement*, the *Consortium Agreement* and the *Partnership Agreement*, we held 2 kick-off meetings in Barcelona and Buenos Aires, we designed and edited the INCASI2 website (<https://incasi.uab.es>) including the maintenance of INCASI1 (<https://webs.uab.cat/incasi1/>), we have designed the training programme that we are preparing to start in November, we presented the 2 deliverables foreseen in the project calendar: the *Communication and Dissemination Plan* and the *Data Management Plan*, and finally we held the first Global Meeting in Seville.

We are grateful for all the work carried out by the various members of the network in their different roles, whose contributions are indispensable for the successful development of the project.

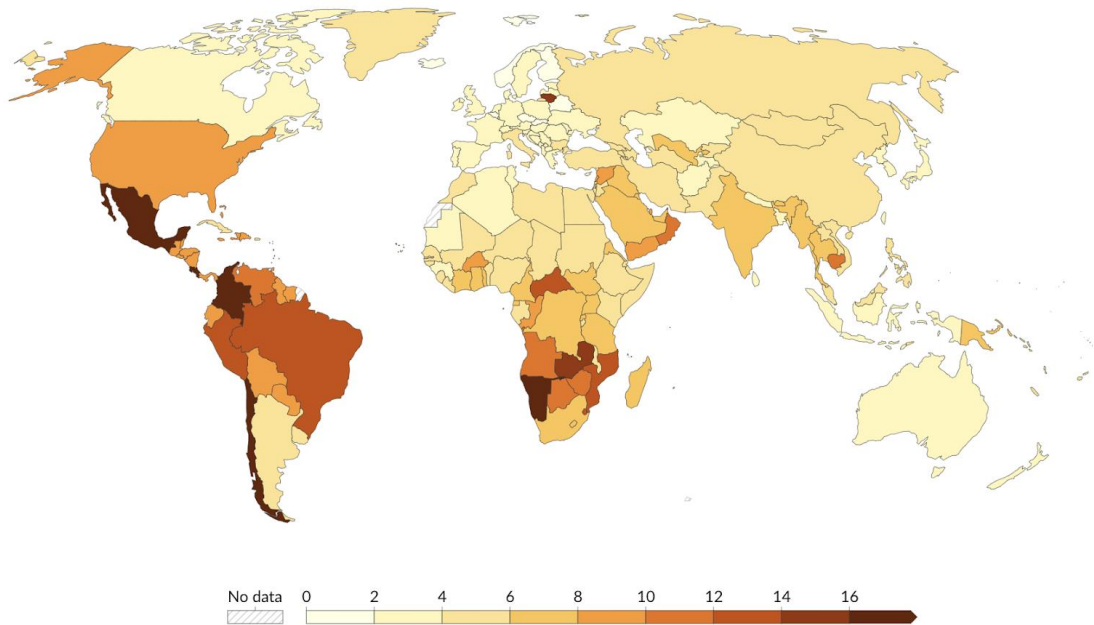

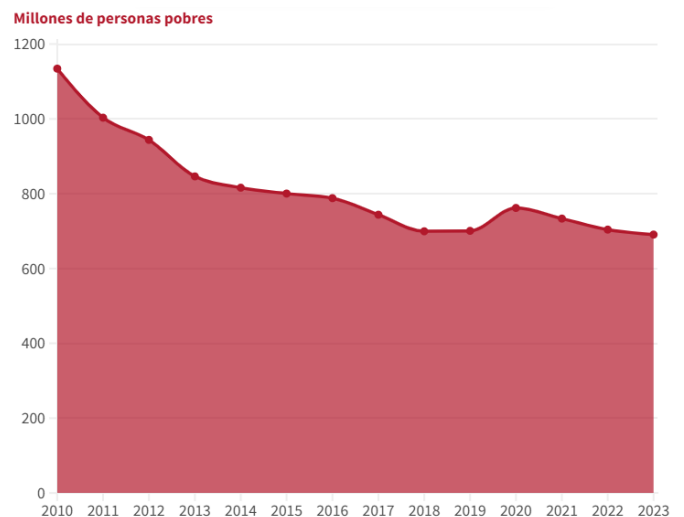
## The inequality data

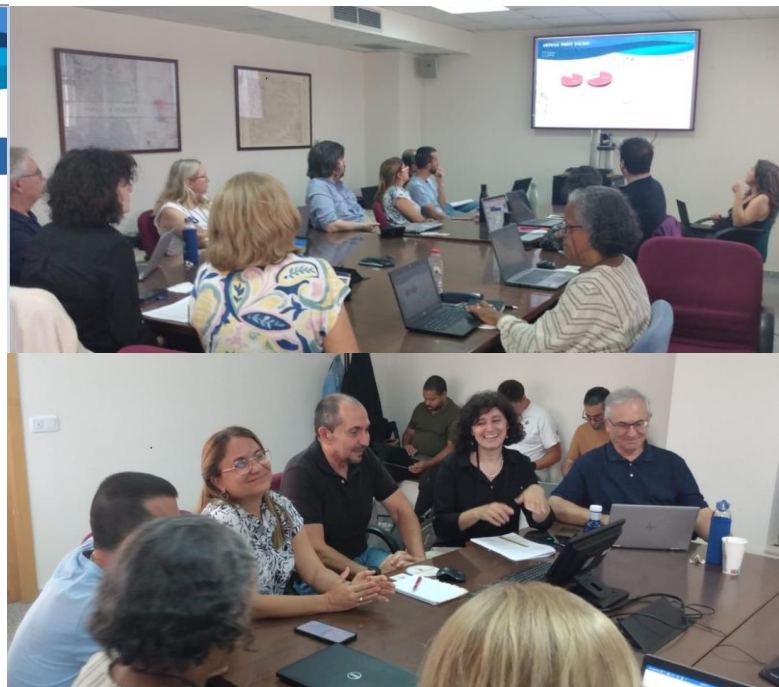


## Article Party

In this article we construct explanatory models of subjective social class positioning in Argentina, which provide new evidence and lines of analysis, considering the historical evolution of these trends. The analyses we present are based on data from the World Values Survey and the National Survey on the Social Structure of Argentina and Public Policies during the Covid-19 pandemic. Among the main results, we find that there is a reasonable degree of objective correspondence between social class position and its subjective identification, although this arrangement is mediated by political and economic contexts that mark differential conjunctures, and which give rise to diverse symbolic repertoires of class images.

Neoliberalism is more than just an economic programme or a political ideology; it is a global civilisational project with a practical normative logic that defines the rules of life and social relations. But perhaps the greatest novelty that neoliberalism offers with respect to classical liberalism is the general principle of generalised competition that forces the rejection of cooperation as a basic principle of coexistence, equality and social development. This principle of generalised competition has been incorporated into all social organisations, including academia as a reference point for scientific knowledge. In the last 20 years, Higher Education Institutions have undergone a change of model under the protection of a deep economic and ethical crisis in Spain and the influence of globalisation. In this sense, this paper focuses mainly on two issues: generalised competition and changes in higher education institutions in Spain. On the one hand, that generalised competition has replaced cooperation as a basic principle in coexistence and social development and, on the other, that higher education institutions in Spain have undergone changes that have increased inequality and the gender gap, leading to the consolidation of an elitist and patriarchal university.

The advance of franchising represents a commitment by business sectors to make the commercial relationship more flexible, in which the leading brands are relieved of the costs of employment management while increasing their income from the licensing of their intangible assets. What are the main characteristics of franchising as a Technical and Management Business Model (MTGE)? What are the main contractual characteristics of this commercial relationship? Does it have an impact on the working and organisational conditions of workers? The aim of this article is to answer these questions by presenting basic aspects of the franchising phenomenon in the commerce sector from the perspective of labour sociology, laying the foundations for future research. Thus, using data from the survey of franchises carried out as part of PICT 031381 in the City of Buenos Aires-Mar del Plata and reports from sectoral chambers, we investigate franchises in Argentina in 2023, framed as a component of the MTGE of growing implementation in the commerce sector.

This paper explores a possible alternative to the classical quantitative approaches to social mobility, based on the life course approach. To do so, we use the Retrospective Demographic Survey conducted by the General Directorate of Statistics and Censuses of the Autonomous City of Buenos Aires in 2019 and we use sequence analysis. As a main result, we arrive at a typology of seven mobility trajectories, which allows us to identify typical differentiated class paths. Two types of trajectories are observed, 'self-employed and traders' and 'intermittency and exit from the labour market', which show a higher level of internal heterogeneity. On average, individuals make slightly more than two changes of status during their lifetime.



Intergenerational reproduction takes on greater weight in the trajectories of service class and low-skilled workers.

Despite its importance for the functioning of the economic system, unpaid domestic and care work (UHCW) has historically been feminised and invisibilised through the naturalisation of inequalities in domestic and work settings. Using time-use data from households in Argentina, we explore, among working women who live with their partners, the link between their paid labour income and the hours they devote to domestic and care work. The results confirm the hypothesis that both women's absolute income and relative income (in comparison with their partners) are negatively and significantly associated with the hours devoted to CDNDR on a daily basis. That is, it is verified that women with higher incomes spend less time on domestic and care tasks.

The Argentinean case, given its early modernisation and the uniqueness of its reversal of development, is instructive on the role of education in intergenerational class mobility. We propose a broad historical analysis of temporal variations in intergenerational class mobility and the role of education in different periods in urban Argentina, specifically in the Buenos Aires Metropolitan Area, from 1960 to 2017. This is the first time that a long-term social mobility study is conducted in Argentina. We analyse intergenerational social mobility according to the EGP class scheme, using absolute rates, log-linear models and long-term counterfactual analysis. The results show a process of social fluidity for men, but not for women. The counterfactual analysis shows that most of the social fluidity among men was due to a reduction in the direct effect from origin class to destination class. There is no evidence of expansion or educational equality effects. This presence of moderate social fluidity has not been linked to a modernisation process that expands upward vertical mobility. Instead, it took place in a context of deindustrialisation and decline of the skilled working class.
