Comparative Insights from Europe and Latin America*, as a result of the conference held at the Università di Calabria last year. You can consult its main characteristics in the news item that appears in this issue and access the document of the publication in open access.

We would like to call for participation in the network through contributions to publications. We remind you that we have different options within the framework of the project. In addition to the publications that you can produce individually or collectively related to INCASI2, in the project we have the Policy Briefs and the INCASI Working Paper Series. We encourage you to submit contributions to them. The characteristics of these publications can be found on the INCASI2 website.

Likewise, through the INCASI network, we create the conditions of possibility for exchange and collaboration between researchers. We encourage you to take advantage of the project to promote comparative analysis of social inequalities between people and groups. We would like to receive information about different initiatives that we can publish in our newsletter. In this regard, we are pleased to inform you of the start of a collaboration between researchers from INCASI2 in a publication project on social mobility in late-industrializing countries in Latin America, Europe and Asia.

We conclude this presentation with updated data on our activities: we have been doing research stays for 221 months by 131 researchers (51.9% women); the INCASI Living Lab sessions held so far are 129: 109 seminars, 8 Methodological Issues, 8 Dialogues, plus 4 Article Parties and 16 seminars where INCASI has participated. With regard to the training courses on comparative analysis of socioeconomic inequalities, we have 132 people enrolled and 489 enrolments in the courses.

INCASI Living Lab

The **INCASI Living Lab** (ILL) is an open space for reflection on socioeconomic inequalities that promotes scientific cooperation, exchange and transfer of knowledge through seminars and meetings between the academic and socio-political spheres, national or international, with the aim of disseminating and discussing analyses, diagnoses and recommendations that serve to guide public policies.

At the time of writing this issue, we have been holding 129 sessions since the beginning of the project, with three different modalities: the **Seminars**, which are organized mainly on the occasion of each research stay; the **Methodological Issues**, where various methodological contents will be presented, both in a qualitative and quantitative or mixed perspective, linked to the objectives of the project; and the **Dialogues**, which encourage open dialogue beyond academia. INCASI Policy Brief

INCASI Policy Brief: *Femicide in Greece: From Recognition to Structural Policy Action*

This policy brief addresses femicide in Greece not as an isolated phenomenon, but as the most extreme expression of structural gender-based violence deeply rooted in patriarchal dynamics, institutional inertia and insufficient public policies. Despite the ratification of the Istanbul Convention and some symbolic legislative advances, the Greek state maintains a fragmented response, with poor data, scarce resources and a lack of political will to implement structural reforms. Based on a critical analysis of current limitations—such as the insufficient number of specialized shelters, the lack of feminist training in the judicial and police system, and the absence of independent oversight mechanisms—the text proposes a paradigmatic shift that recognizes femicide as a form of gender extermination. The recommendations include the creation of a national feminist observatory, the expansion of support infrastructure, the institutionalization of training in gender perspective, and the opening of a legislative debate that considers femicide as a crime against humanity. Overall, the document underlines that every measure not taken is a political decision with fatal consequences.

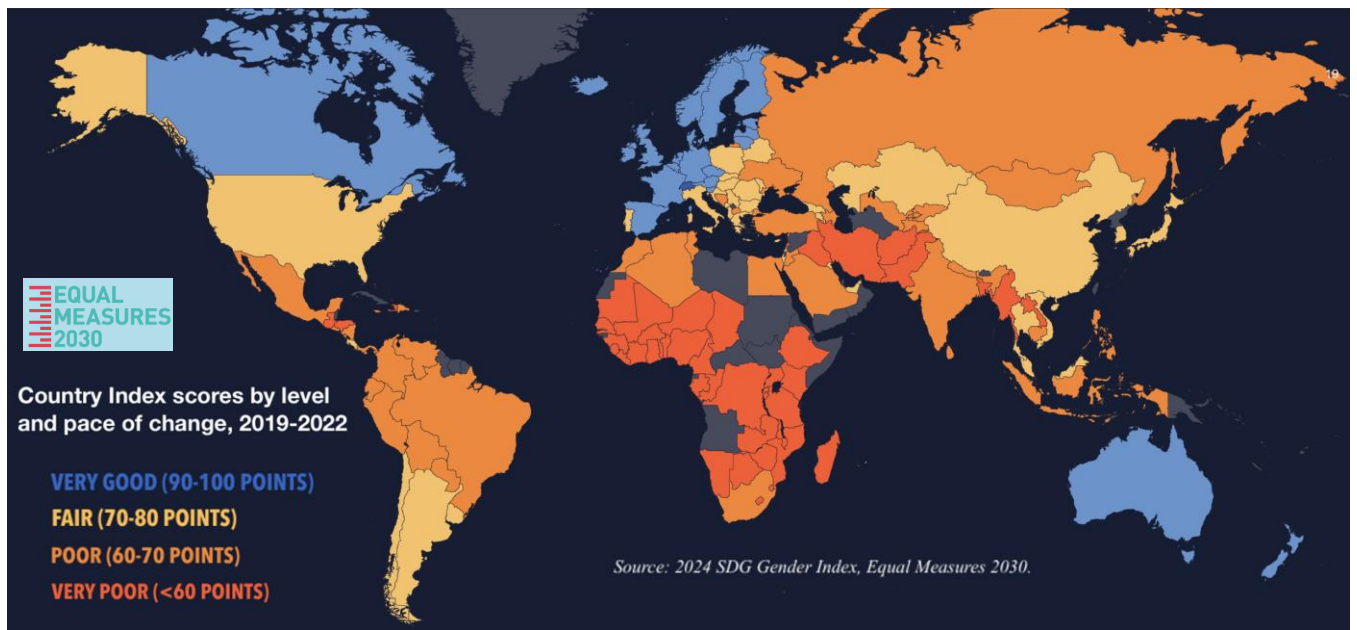




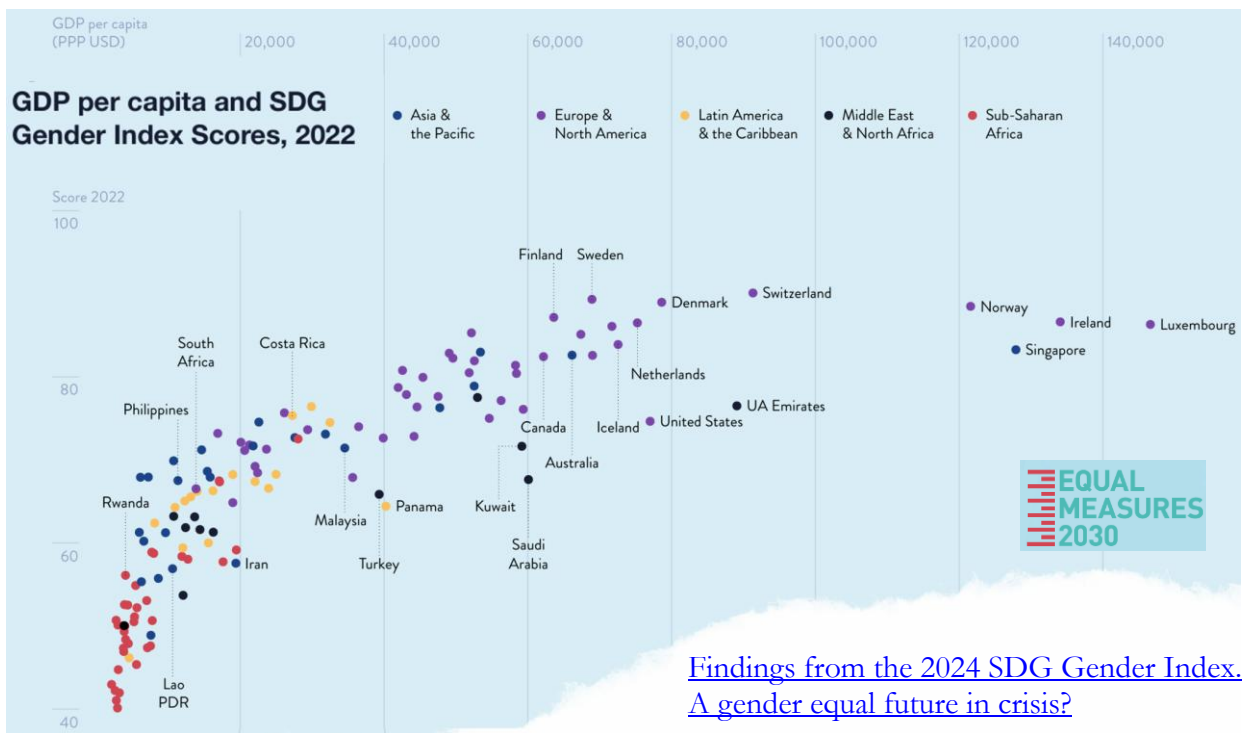
The map of inequality

International Seminar on Inequalities at Middlesex University

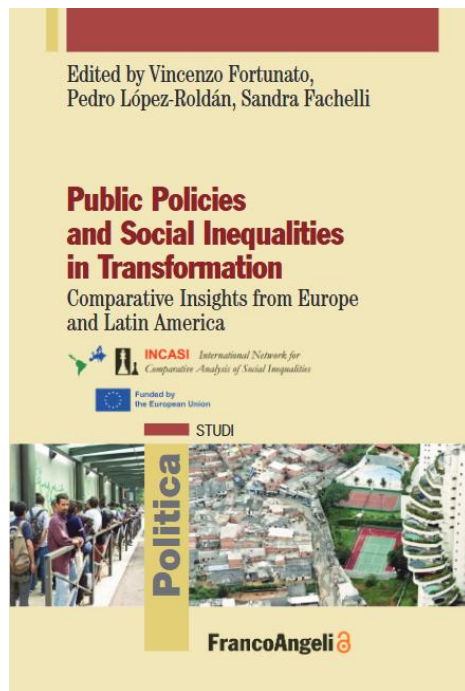
On March 23, 2026, Middlesex University hosted the workshop “*Unequal Maps, Shared Destinations? Navigating Inequalities on Academic Pathways*”, jointly organised by The British Academy and CEEDR, in collaboration with the INCASI2 project. The meeting brought together researchers, practitioners, institutional decision-makers and experts in higher education and inequalities to discuss inequalities in academic and labour trajectories, including precariousness, migration and the experiences of researchers in the early stages of their careers. INCASI contributed with a presentation by Prof. Pedro López-Roldán and Prof. Sandra Fachelli, highlighting how social mobility is conditioned by labour market segmentation and unequal returns from higher education. The meeting underscored the importance of international collaboration and the need to move towards more inclusive academic and labour systems.

This volume examines the transformations of public policies and social welfare institutions in Europe and Latin America from a comparative and interdisciplinary perspective. Building on the theoretical and empirical advances of the INCASI project, it explores how states, social actors and political regimes have reconfigured their responses to inequality in the face of multiple crises: economic, social, environmental and technological. The chapters gathered here offer a multidimensional vision of public policies, combining macrostructural analyses of welfare and labour regimes with micro-level studies on care, education, and digital work. They reveal the persistent

tensions between state intervention, market dynamics and social demands for equality, as well as the emergence of new institutional complementarities between predistributive and redistributive policies.

This document contains a systematization of state and European Union experiences on official measurements of work and employment mediated by digital platforms and contributions to government decision-making aimed at guaranteeing official registration and data of the platform economy together with minimum innovations that can be implemented in Argentina: Permanent Household Survey; National Survey of Workers on Employment, Work, Health and Safety Conditions; National Migrant Survey Argentina and National Survey of Cultural Consumption.

The article explores how the Argentine education system contributes to processes of stratification and social mobility through hidden mechanisms of social selection. Based on statistical data on educational distribution by socioeconomic level and performance in language and mathematics, persistent inequalities at the end of secondary education are evidenced through academic results. Likewise, based on a survey of 588 families from different cities of the country, school choice strategies aimed at avoiding downward social mobility are examined. The results show that the choice of private schools, especially in secondary education and among popular sectors and impoverished middle classes, functions as a mechanism of social closure for consolidated groups and as a preventive strategy for sectors in transition. Overall, the study points to a growing process of educational segmentation that redefines contemporary forms of social reproduction and differentiation.

The objective of this article is to analyse the effect of social class on the perceptions of the Argentine population regarding the socioeconomic redistribution policies implemented during the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic. The "National Survey on the Social Structure of Argentina and Public Policies during the Covid-19 Pandemic" (ESAyPP/Pisacovid-19), carried out on 5,239 adults in urban areas between October and December 2021, was used. The analysis focuses on the degree of support or rejection of these policies and the effect of social class on redistributive preferences, also taking into account other sociodemographic and attitudinal factors. In particular, a multiple linear regression is implemented to assess the social class position on redistributive preferences, controlling for variables such as gender, age, class identity, and political orientation. Based on these results, a macrosocial analysis is postulated to determine if there is a dynamic of class polarization with respect to socioeconomic redistribution in Argentina.

The article focuses on the inequalities that permeate the educational transitions from secondary to higher education in Argentina, from a comparative perspective between regions of the country. First, data from the National Survey on the Social Structure of Argentina and Public Policies during the COVID-19 Pandemic (ESAyPP/PISAC-COVID-19) surveyed in 2021 are used. In this stage, she worked with Averages of marginal effects to capture regional similarities and differences around high school graduation and access to higher education. Subsequently, in a complementary way, a factorial model was built from the Aprender tests (2019) and its complementary questionnaires. School performance in the last year of secondary school was analysed based on its links with characteristics of the school offer and the social origin of the students. The results show a process of inequality of transversal educational opportunities where children from working class or from households with a low educational climate suffer the greatest hardships. However, these stratification processes tend to be exacerbated or minimized depending on the region and the historical moment analysed, giving guidelines for different forms of educational expansion that bring with them configurations of regional inequality.

The book develops the tension between a slow time – marked by late policies and programs – and the technological acceleration that transforms the contemporary temporal experience. Through references to Derrida, Benjamin, Ciorán, Hirschman, Mascareño, Von Wolfersdorff, Wallerstein, Streeck, Deleuze and Pelbart, the paradoxes of time, its ruptures, discontinuities and effects on the social, political and economic life of the country are examined. These distinctions allow us to understand the implications of time that has exploded in phenomena of inclusion-exclusion, in postponed crises, in expectations of development and in the need to face scenarios of risk, uncertainty and conflict.

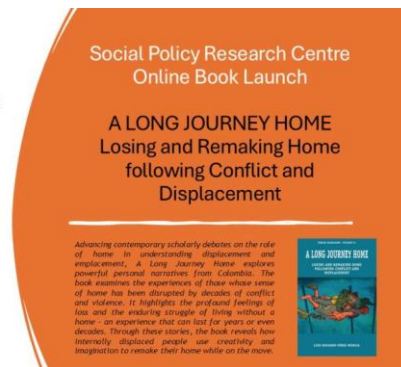

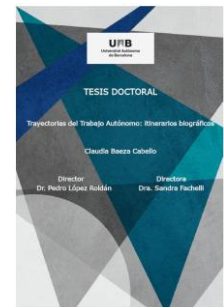
