### **PROGRAMME**

Developing foreign language skills alone is not enough for translators and interpreters. They must also have a good background knowledge of the culture and society within which the language they are learning operates to successfully negotiate extra-linguistic references.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- To provide students with a general knowledge base about the UK: history, geography; its people, their background and way of life.
- Reinforce language skills: listening and reading comprehension with videos, radio broadcasts, texts from books and newspaper and magazine articles; and communication skills through group discussions and class presentations.

#### COURSE CONTENT

The topics covered are:

- 1. History and geography of the UK.
- 2. British government and politics.
- 3. The British legal system.
- 4. Education in Britain.
- 5. The "national identity" phenomenon, demographics, religion and immigration.

#### MATERIALS

Dossiers covering the topics listed above will be available at the photocopy services or Campus Virtual. See your course instructor concerning availability of course materials (dossiers, assignments, other class materials, etc.) on the Campus Virtual.

#### ASSESSMENT

This class is divided into two modules: UK and US. The final grade is based on the average from course assignments / quizzes (40%) and the final exam (60%). This division breaks down equally across the two modules.

Assignments / Quizzes will be given on a regular basis with specific deadlines (for assignments) or dates (for in-class quizzes). Students who miss or are unable to attend classes are responsible for handing in class assignments on time or, in the case of in-class quizzes, making prior alternative arrangements. An assignment will not be accepted after the deadline and cases of plagiarism will result in a zero grade.

The final exam for each module (UK and US) comprises two equally weighted sections: a reading comprehension and general knowledge questions based on the course materials provided.

IF YOU KNOW THAT YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO COMPLY WITH THE COURSE WORK REQUIREMENT, YOU MUST COMMUNICATE THIS FACT TO YOUR INSTRUCTOR IN WRITING BEFORE OCTOBER 31, 2004.

Students who do not comply with the course work requirements:

- Students who inform their instructor(s) in writing within the time limit (see above) can take the final exam, but they must pass both UK and US module final exams with a minimum 60% average in each exam to pass.
- Repeaters who have previously passed the course work can present their graded work
  from that course for consideration as a substitution for the required continuous assessment
  component. Repeaters who have not done the course work must pass both UK and US
  modules final exams with a minimum of 60% average in each exam to pass.
