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OBJECTIVES

The aim of the C3 language course is to further develop students' language skills acquired in the previous cycle, and to distinguish and reproduce different registers, genres, and text types. All language skills will be touched on, although special emphasis will be placed on reading comprehension, summarising, and writing skills.

CONTENT

Students will work with a variety of texts as well as with audio-visual material. Activities will include: reading exercises, summarising information activities, the mechanics of writing, and class discussions. The main focus of this class is to allow students to speak and actively participate in language skills activities during class time.

ASSESSMENT

The final grade is based on the average from course assignments (40%) and the final exam (60%). The final exam comprises three equally weighted sections: summary, reading comprehension and a written essay.
