## ASSESSMENT

The final grade is based on the average from course assignments (40%) and the final exam (60%). Students unable to attend classes are responsible for handing in class assignments on time. Plagiarism will result in a zero grade. The final exam comprises three equally weighted sections: summary, reading comprehension and a written essay.
