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BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT

A selection of standard and non-standard varieties of English around the world will be reviewed, although the largest part of the course will be devoted to the British Isles and North America. The varieties studied will reflect the different language ecologies and social contexts in which English is used, and students will come into contact with these varieties through tapes, videos and texts. We will analyse varieties of English within their socio-historical and linguistic context, and critically discuss issues of language and dialect classification, standard vs. non-standard varieties and standard ideologies, norm-giving and norm-receiving, and the native/non-native dichotomy.

OBJECTIVES

- the student will widen his/her vision of the variety and functions of English in the world today
- from an instrumental point of view, exposure to varieties s/he has not usually
 encountered to date in the degree will enable the student to understand speakers of
 different varieties more easily
- the student will learn to work with dialectal data and to analyse real audiovisual materials for linguistic profile features
- s/he will understand and be able both to apply and define a number of basic sociolinguistic and dialectological concepts
- s/he will be able to distinguish between criteria and attitudes which are linguistically
 motivated and those which are socially motivated and will develop a greater selfawareness of which attitudes are operative on particular occasions when making
 language judgments.

ASSESSMENT

Students will be assessed by:

- audio-based (and if technically possible) video-based practice worksheets 30%
- text commentaries 10%
- critical article reading 10%
- class participation 10%
- final exam 40%

Note: The level of English will be taken into account when correcting hand-in work, exam and overall mark.

TUTORIALS

These sessions in reduced groups will involve discussion of audiovisual material already prepared out of class, discussion and clarification of data and concepts arising from readings and library research. They will be assessed in relation to the preparatory work done for elements 1 and 3 of the list above and participation in the tutorials.

OBSERVATIONS

The course relies heavily on concepts and tools acquired in 1st-cycle subjects, especially grammar, syntax, phonetics and phonology. Although not essential, previous experience with History of English will be extremely useful. The level of instrumental English expected is at least the one required to pass "Instrumental English II". A student who does not have a good grasp of standard English will have problems in distinguishing and comparing standard and non-standard varieties.

Material will be provided during the course (part of it through the "Campus Virtual").
