BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT

This course is designed to be a comprehensive introduction to the history and culture of the United Kingdom and Ireland. The first semester will consist of a general chronological survey of the main historical events that have shaped these nations. The second part of the course will be organized around the following areas: class, ethnicity, gender and space.
