BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT

This course is designed to be a comprehensive introduction to the history and culture of the United Kingdom and Ireland. The first semester will deal with events from the Roman occupation of Britain in the first century AD up to the early 18 century. The second semester will cover the 18, 19 and early 20 centuries including Britain's overseas expansion.
