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BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT

Contemporary American Literature is a survey course that deals with works by American authors from the 1960s onwards. We will be reading a variety of texts from several American cultural perspectives.

OBJECTIVES

The aim of this course is to discuss and analyse the texts through class debates and individual reflection. Some of the main issues addressed in the course will be the concepts of canon, ethnicity and identity in the United States. We will attempt a literary and historical contextualization and an analysis of how American writers depict, understand and construct (American) identity in their texts. The texts to be studied have been chosen from a variety of genres: autobiography, novel, short story, poetry and essay.
