### **BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT**

This course is designed to be a comprehensive introduction to the history and culture of the United Kingdom and Ireland. The first semester will deal with events from the Roman occupation of Britain in the first century AD up to the early 18<sup>th</sup> century. The second semester will cover the 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries including Britain's overseas expansion.

- acquaint students with a wide range of aspects that have contributed to the shaping of the people and culture of the United Kingdom and Ireland
- analyse the role and the influence of the most outstanding personalities
- encourage students to consider not just the events themselves but the way they have been narrated and the role of history in the formation of a common culture
