BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT

The course will explore and give practice in writing a variety of recognized genres: the academic paper, journalistic writing and creative writing (the short story). Throughout the course, there will be a consideration of the major characteristics of the written style, followed by practice opportunities, and finally a series of written assignments. A theoretical perspective will be adopted when useful, but most of the time students will be working on practical problems of text construction, such as generating, developing and revising ideas, as well as on other writing activities such as text analysis and peer revision.

OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the course is to give participants practice in writing the three different types of genres while at the same time improve their writing skills and strategies as well as their English proficiency.

SYLLABUS

- 1-Introduction to writing: genre, discursive patterns, writing purposes and writing strategies.
- 2- The academic paper: typical discursive patterns, the sections of an academic paper, using bibliographical references and the academic language style.
- 3. Journalistic writing: general features of news, opinion writing.
- 4. The short story: general features, discursive patterns, evoking a mood.

ASSESSMENT

- 1. Regular classwork and participation 25%
- 2. Three assignments 25% each

TUTORIALS

Students will be individually tutored throughout the process of writing drafts before they submit their final papers
