Objectives and Contextualisation

This course's objective is to initiate the student into the knowledge of most basic and essential aspects of phonetic, morphological, lexical, syntactic, semantical and pragmatic structures of Korean language, and work the four basic communicative abilities. At the end of the course, the student will be able to:

- Know and understand basic phonetic, morphological, lexical, syntactic and pragmatic structures of Korean language.
- Use linguistic, cultural and thematic knowledge to understand and to communicate orally or by written in Korean about issues regarding their particular and immediate environment.
- Express orally and in writing in Korean about the student's particular and immediate environment.
- Employ different strategies in order to solve understanding problems about issues regarding his particular and immediate environment.
- Develop independent learning strategies.

- Developing self-learning strategies.

Learning outcomes

Content

The course's contents are the following:

1. Phonological and morphological contents:

- Korean alphabet and its special features: learning basic 19 consonants and 12 vocals
- Acquisition and mastering phonetic mechanisms.
- Syllables combination and transcription system.
- Word order.

2. Grammatical contents:

- Personal and demonstrative pronouns.
- Basic grammatical particles placing (nominal suffixes)
- Verbs declarative and interrogative termination
- Negating verbs
- Interrogative pronouns
- · Different styles of talking-colloquial style
- Verbal tense-the past-
- Numbers and measures
- Use of honorific verb
- Use of grammatical particles and postpositions
- verbal tense future expressions
- Adjectives and adverbs
- Comparative sentences
- Periphrastic and auxiliary verbs
- Connectors: coordinate and subordinate conjunctions

3. Communicative and sociocultural contents:

- Greetings
- Introducing oneself
- Talking about one's studies
- Who, How, When and Why questions
- Suggesting, inviting or asking for information
- Counting
- Expressing in a style adequate to the other person
- Expressing completed or in progress actions
- Expressing present or future actions
- Expressing things we like or preferences
- Expressing cause-consequence connections
- Expressing different types of comparisons

Methodology

Educational activities are divided into <u>led activities</u>, <u>supervised activities</u>, <u>independent work and evaluation activities</u>.

- During led activities time (90 hours),

the teacher will explain the most important contents of each unit and he also will do out loud reading and oral and written comprehension exercises, as well as oral expression exercises, grammatical aspects and new vocabulary practice, sight translation, dictations in the blackboard, review of learnt contents, etc. About 15 hours will be employed for each unit, and class activities will be of different kinds (oral and written, individual and in group).

- <u>Supervised activities</u> (which will be not only in-person, but also virtual) (51h) will be focused on oral comprehension and expression activities, as well as on exercise-solving.
- <u>Independent work</u> (which will be of about 150 hours) will be writing and vocabulary practice, text and new grammatical aspects preparation and review, and exercise solving and self-evaluation (by means of the teaching web).
- Evaluation activity (10 hours) will be divided into in-person (exams) and led (teaching folder) evaluation.

Evaluation

Written and oral exams.

During the course, the students will take three exams. Different competences will be evaluated depending on the students' learning stage and the exams will account for a 70% of the final note.

The exact dates of the exams are the last thursdays of October, November and January. If any student cannot attend the class one of these days, he will have to previously inform the teacher and do it on an agreed date as soon as possible.

Teaching folder.

That includes delivering a selection of tasks proposed by the teachers. For every unit, some tasks will be delivered depending on the case. The tasks will include vocabulary, oral or written expression, and grammar exercises. Tasks must be delivered **on time** in order to be evaluated, so **they will not be accepted unless they are delivered on time**. This part will account for a 30% of the final note.

This course has not a second examination right.
