Objectives and Contextualisation

This optional class is integrated into the fourth year curriculum of the Criminology Degree program, within the Criminal Enforcement concentration. It aims to give students an overview of major mental disorders, as well as their relation to the investigation of crimes. Additionally, aspects related to the management and protocols of such offenders are considered from the perspective of forensic psychiatry.

Content

This course comprises 6 credits of the ECTS model. Each of these credits includes 25 hours of teaching, which makes a total of 150 hours, distributed as follows:

- 15 classroom sessions, 3 hours each: 45 hours
- Hours of external student work: 105 hours

In-Class sessions:

The sessions will be held during the first quarter of the 2016-17 course (beginning on September 16, 2016 and ending on January 27, 2017). They will be held on Fridays, from 12:00pm to 3:30pm (12.00-15.30) and will include a half hour break. Within the concentration, this class is the first part of theoretical exposition and the second part of the practical seminar.
