There are no previous requirements.

Objectives and Contextualisation

To make the students familiar with audiovisual translation for dubbing. To learn how to adjust and adapt scripts as a complementary task for translation.

To learn how to subtitle from different perspectives: technical (programmes, time and space limitations) and linguistic (genres, orality, etc).

Skills

- Master strategies for the correction, linguistic revision and post-edition of audiovisual products.

- Use specific software to translate and make accessible audiovisual products, multimedia products and video games.

Learning outcomes

7. Identify the principal characteristics, similarities and differences of dubbing and subtitling.
8. Produce translations for dubbing and subtitling that conform to the restrictions of space and synchronisation inherent to each mode.
9. Produce translations for dubbing and subtitling that fulfill the industry's professional standards.
10. Recognise the financial and professional aspects of the dubbing and subtitling market.
11. Solve translation difficulties in dubbing and subtitling and justify decisions taken.
12. Use databases with cinema screenplays and show familiarity with different Media style guides.
13. Work in and lead teams engaging in audiovisual translation for dubbing and subtitling.

Unit 2. Localizing subtitles and technical conventions.

Unit 3. Linguistic conventions and orthotypography.

Unit 4. Cultural references and dialectal differences.

Unit 5. Cultural references and humour.

Unit 6. Professional aspects.

Methodology

We use an active methodology with different activities.

We use the Virtual Campus for the regular classes and Moodle for the virtual classroom.

We will propose several translation, adjusting and subtitling tasks to help students understand the whole process and to make them think and find their own solutions to, finally, enter the professional market.

The activities can be directed by teacher, supervised or totally independent. We will also encourage cooperative learning and data searching, as well as critical spirit and personal style.

Evaluation

Evaluation

The information concerning student evaluation, namely the assessed tasks and their relative weighting in the final mark, is a general orientation only. The lecturer teaching this course will provide a detailed description and breakdown at the beginning of the semester.

REVISION

Prior to formally entering final marks, the lecturer will publish the date and time for assessment revision and the final mark.

The lecturer and student will agree on the day and time to revise any of the assessed course activities.

RECUPERATION

Students have the right to resit or make up evaluated work providing they have submitted a minimum of 66.6% (two thirds), or more, of the formally assessed work which makes up the final grade and who have an average of 3.5 or more according to the evaluation criteria.

The lecturer will inform students of the procedure for resitting or making up evaluated work when they publish the final grade. This will be published before the final mark is entered into the system. The lecturer may require an individual assignment or test to make up for each failed evaluated task, or task not performed, or choose to combine failed assessed tasks for the same purpose.

NOT ASSESSABLE

A mark of no-evaluable(N/A Not Assessable) will be awarded if a student fails to hand in more than 25% of the assessed work used to calculate the final mark.

IRREGULARITIES

In cases of plagiarism, copying, identity theft, etc. in an evaluation activity, a mark of "0" will be given. If such a case is detected over more than one of the evaluable exercises then the student will be given a final mark of "0" for the course.

A student does not have the right to resitting or making up work in cases of plagiarism, copying or identity theft.
