Prerequisites

The course is aimed at students who have already completed and passed the course Modern Language III (Italian) or who can demonstrate that they have acquired level B1 through a level test which must be taken at the beginning of the course. This course is not conceived for native and/or students with advanced knowledge of Italian.

Objectives and Contextualisation

The objective of the course is to deepen the knowledge of the Italian language following the lines established in the previous level: to broaden the basic knowledge of Italian morphology, syntax and lexicon so that, in the end, the student is able to better articulate sounds, to construct and recognize more complex sentences, to read texts of a certain level of difficulty, to participate in conversations and using the appropriate tone and vocabulary, to understand longer messages and to write short texts with correction, within the scope of knowledge of an intermediate-advanced language course (equivalent to B2).

2. Pragmatic fields, notions, functions and cultural elements.

During the course we will work to develop the ability to act in certain communication contexts. In particular, and in formal and informal contexts:

- a) expressing desires, problems and hypotheses; making predictions
- b) express opinions, preferences, tastes;
- c) narrate using different forms of the past;
- e) expressing advice and / or instructions orally and / or in writing;
- f) expressing the personal point and dealing with others;
- g) produce formal letters of protest, request, etc. .;
- h) Collect and report information from different texts.

Methodology

The subject of Italian Language IV is instrumental and essentially practical. The emphasis in the training activities will be on the active participation of the students in order to reach the competences foreseen in this teaching guide.

In general terms, learning will be directed through the following set of techniques and actions:

- Master class with ICT support and collective discussion

- Practice of written and oral expression in Italian language
- Analysis of grammatical phenomena
- Comprehensive reading of texts, video materials, film screening
- Individual and group exercises, both written and oral
- Accomplishment of autonomous activities: exercises of the notebook, preparation of the tests, readings, writing, search of information in Internet ...
- Class exchanges (teacher-student, student-student)
- grammar, written / oral expression and written / oral comprehension tests
- game-based learning

Annotation: Within the schedule set by the centre or degree programme, 15 minutes of one class will be reserved for students to evaluate their lecturers and their courses or modules through questionnaires.

Assessment

The assessment is continuous (100%) and it is based on the following sections:

-Continuous evaluation (100% of the final grade):

- a) Participation in all written and oral activities done in class. Attendance will also be taken into account.(= 15%).
- b) Test 1 (20%).
- c) Test 2 (35 %)
- d) Written comprehension (10 %)
- e) Oral exam (20 %)

All Italian language skills will be assessed: grammar, oral and written comprehension and expression.

The participation considers an active class participation, the realizations of written activities and the exercises proposed by the teacher in the Virtual Campus and those indicated in the online workbook. Moreover, will be taken into account the attendance to extracurricular cultural activities related to the subject (reading club, writing workshop, exhibitions, etc.) that may be proposed by the teacher.

To be evaluated (or to obtain the possibility for a make up exam), the student must have been evaluated in a set of activities the weight of which is equivalent to a minimum of 2/3 of the total of the exams.

The student will receive a grade of No avaluable if he/she has not completed more than 30% of the evaluation activities.

Only students who, having failed, have at least a final grade of 3.5, have the right to a make-up (total or partial, as appropriate).

Class Participation and all other class activity are excluded from a make-up.

A make-up exam will be an exam related to the part that needs to be re-evaluated (test 1, test 2, written comprehension and oral test).

A student must pass each of the make-ups (test 1, test 2, written comprehension and oral test) in order to have the right to be fully evaluated.

Students must inform themselves on all the class activities and exams. The professor is not responsible.

For each exam, the teacher will inform the student (Moodle) on the procedure and date of revision of the grades.

Grading criteria are decided by the professor and, eventually, shared by the entire teaching team.

The make-up exam schedule can not be modified.

In case the student makes any irregularity that may lead to a significant variation of the grade of an exam, this will be graded as 0 and will be excluded from a make-up, regardless of the disciplinary process that may follow. In case of several irregularities in the exams of the same subject, **the final grade of this class will be 0.**

This subject entirely prohibits the use of AI technologies in all of its activities. Any submitted work that contains content generated using AI will be considered academic dishonesty; the corresponding grade will be awarded a zero, without the possibility of reassessment. In cases of greater infringement, more serious action may be taken.

Erasmus students requesting to advance an exam must submit a written document from their home university to the professor justifying their request.

This class does not contemplate the possibility of “avaluació única”.
