# What should you cite?



#### You should cite...

Any idea, theory, data, argument, sentence, image, graphics, or any other content that is NOT your own.



#### You do not need to cite...

Your own ideas, theories and conclusions, as well as any information that is considered common knowledge.







To give proper credit and acknowledge the work of the original author.




To assist readers in finding the referenced materials, such as books, articles, websites, etc., in case they want to delve deeper into the topic and explore further.



To provide credibility and rigour to your work, enhancing its reliability and academic integrity.



To avoid plagiarism.





Citing your sources proves that you have conducted thorough research on the subject matter.





#### How to cite?



A link between the text of your work and the ideas, theories, passages, etc., borrowed from external sources.

They are short notations placed within the intellectual work, indicating a bibliographic reference for the source.

Bibliographic information identifying the cited documents.





List of all the sources cited or consulted during the research.

Arranged alphabetically, chronologically, or by subject area.

Included at the end of the research work.





# **Citation styles**



#### What are they?

Citation styles are sets of guidelines that provide instructions on how to format and include citations and references in academic works.



#### What for?

The formatting and numbering of source information (author, title, year, etc.) should be done according to the guidelines of the chosen citation style, both for in-text citations and references.



#### Why?

The purpose of using a specific citation style is to ensure consistent presentation of citations and references throughout the entire work.





# Which citation style should I go with?

Before you begin writing citations and references, it's essential to decide on the citation style you will use.

There exist various citation and referencing styles.

You must select a style and maintain consistency throughout your work.

The style you choose will depend on your study area and the intended destination of your work, with guidance from your tutor.

Consult your **tutor** for the recommended citation style.

In this course all the examples are based on APA style, very used in Social Sciences.

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

# BIBLIOGRAPHIC DATA

Each style determines what bibliographic information should be included in the reference: title, author, publisher, publication date, volume...



# ORDER WITHIN THE REFERENCE

Once you choose the bibliographic data, it should appear following the order set by the style.



#### **FORMAT**

The style determines the format of the reference elements: italics, capital letters...




#### **PUNCTUATION**

The citation style also determines the puntuation signs in order to separate the different elements that make up a reference







Having picked a style, the format of the bibliographic references changes in accordance to the **document type** of the work you want to cite. For example, when referring to a printed book you will use different elements to those of a journal article.

When using the <u>APA style guide</u>, follow the guidelines in accordance: the elements that have to appear, the order of these within the reference, formatting (italics, etc.), punctuation (parentheses, quotation marks, full stops, etc.).

Under what circumstances should you include database or archive information in a reference?



ONLY when it is necessary for readers to retrieve the cited work from that specific database or archive.



When it cites original, proprietary works that are exclusively available in that particular database or archive. For instance, works found in databases like *Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews* or *UpToDate* fall under this category.



For works of limited circulation or unpublished sources, such as theses, manuscripts, preprints, and similar materials.





To mention a webpage in general, all that is needed is to include the name of the webpage and the URL in the text of your work. There is no need to create a reference list entry or an intext citation for this type mention.



When the author's name and the site name are the same, you can omit the site name from the source element in the citation.



When the webpage you are citing does not indicate a date, use "n.d." (no date) in place of the publication date in your citation.



Include a retrieval date only when the content is intended to change over time and the page is not archived.

#### **Content**

Text only, text with audiovisuals (e.g.: photos, videos), or audiovisuals alone.

If audiovisuals are present, indicate them in square brackets after the text of the post. For example: [attached image], [infographic], etc.



### Misspelling

Cite the text as it appears.

Social media posts might contain nonstandard spelling and capitalization, hashtags, links and emojis...

Do not make any alterations to the spelling and capitalization in the social media references.



#### Hashtags and emojis

Retain hashtags and links. Replicate emojis, if possible.

# Bibliography vs Reference list

- List of bibliographic references consulted to do the work.
- References can be arranged alphabetically, chronologically or by subject.

- List of bibliographic references of all the documents cited in the work.
- References are arranged alphabetically.



- If you use APA referencing style, you have to provide a reference list.
- Include only the sources cited in your work. Do not include all the bibliography you have consulted.
- Place your reference list at the end of your work.
- Start your reference list on a new page after the text of your work.
- There has to be a one-to-one correspondence between the works cited in the text and the works listed in the reference list.





• For works with the same author in the same date, use lowercase letters after the year to differentiate the references. Make sure to indicate this differentiation in both the in-text citation and the corresponding reference entry in the reference list. Order these works based on the alphabetical order of their titles.


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


